The Cleveland Council on Soviet Anti-Semitism (CCSA) is a volunteer organization whose goals are to assist Soviet Jews to emigrate, to inform the American public about Jewish activities in the Soviet Union, and to monitor anti-semitism in the USSR. The CCSA, the first organization of its kind in the world, was established in 1963 through the efforts of NASA scientists Louis Rosenblum and Abe Silverstein, VA Hospital psychologist Herbert Caron, and Rabbi Daniel Litt. The four men, members of Beth Israel-The West Temple, were supported by the congregation which provided volunteer workers and office space for the CCSA.

The CCSA sought to educate the public regarding the plight of Soviet Jews at a time when the problem was not generally recognized. The Council organized letter-writing campaigns to government officials, sponsored rallies and protests, corresponded with Soviet Jews, and lobbied Congress and the President in an effort to link economic aid to the Soviet Union to the issue of human rights. Between 1964 and 1969 the CCSA produced a handbook for community activity; created a motion picture and slide show depiciting the problem of Soviet Jewry; published Spotlight, the nation's first newsletter on Soviet Jews; and devised patterns for protests against visiting Soviet groups and officials. In 1966, the Jewish Community Federation of Cleveland became the first Federation in the U.S. to allocate funds for this issue by providing funds for the CCSA's educational activities.

By 1965, the CCSA counted 600 members. Its success was recognized nationally and it became a model for other local groups. CCSA leaders, especially Louis Rosenblum, assisted in the organization of local groups throughout the United States and Canada. By 1969, five other councils had been established and in February 1970 the six organizations joined to create the Union of Councils for Soviet Jews (UCSJ) to share information and to strengthen the movement nationally. Rosenblum served as the first president of the UCSJ and its office was initially located in Cleveland. In 1972, a Washington, D.C. office was opened and staffed by one salaried employee who acted as Congressional and media liaison. In 1985 the UCSJ included 32 member council representing a membership of 50,000.

The Cleveland Council on Soviet Anti-Semitism Records, 1960-1983, are divided into three series: Cleveland Council on Soviet Anti-Semitism Records, Union of Councils for Soviet Jewry Records, and Publications. Each series is divided into sub-series and files within the sub-series are arranged alphabetically.

The CCSA Records, maintained by Dr. Louis Rosenblum, have some of the qualities of personal papers. Because Rosenblum served as the first president of the Union of Councils for Soviet Jewry (UCSJ), and the UCSJ office was initially in Cleveland, their records were also maintained by him. In many instances a folder contains records of both organizations. Any folder that was clearly marked as part of the UCSJ records has been included in that series. Some subject and correspondence files established by Rosenblum as a leader of the CCSA prior to the formation of the UCSJ were subsequently included in the files of the latter organization and were labeled as UCSJ records. This explains the apparent discrepency in dates for UCSJ files predating the organization's creation. Files not clearly marked as UCSJ records were assumed to be CCSA records and included in the appropriate series.

Series I: Cleveland Council on Soviet Anti-Semitism Records, consists of three sub-series: Administrative files, Correspondence and Documents Received, and Subject and Program Files.

Sub-Series 1, Administrative Files, includes records on the founding of CCSA, scattered minutes of early meetings, membership files and lists, general correspondence, a copy of the Council's Handbook for Community Action, and correspondence relating to The Spotlight.

Sub-Series 2A, Correspondence and Transcripts of Telephone Conversations with Soviet Jews, includes correspondence with several of the more famous Soviet Jews as well as with a number of others. The correspondence includes letters to and from Jews both in the Soviet Union and outside following emigration. The transcripts of conversations are almost exclusively with "Rufuseniks" and were prepared by organizations throughout the U.S. interested in Soviet Jewry.

Sub-Series 2B, Correspondence with Individuals in the United States and Israel (not Soviet Jews), includes communications with various individuals involved in the Soviet Jewry movement. Among these are Cynthia Ozick Hallote, Leonard Schroeter, Michael Sherbourne of London (a primary Western telephone link with Jews in the USSR), and Ann Shenkar. Of special historical interest are the three folders of correspondence with Mrs. Shenkar, a private Israeli citizen who created and maintained in Israel an independent collection and distribution operation for timely information on Jews in the USSR. Although the bulk of the same information was also obtained by the Israeli government only a portion of it was ever released to activists in the West or to the general public.

Sub-Series 2C, Soviet Jewry Documents Received, includes material smuggled out of the Soviet Union relating to trials of "Refuseniks," messages from prisoners in the Gulag, petitions to Soviet authorities, and writings by Soviet Jews. Many of the documents were microfilmed in the Soviet Union. Photocopies of a few of the microfilms are included here; original microfilm has been removed to the photograph and print collection (Picture Group 287).

Sub-Series 3, Subject and Program Files, consists of records relating to the various programs and projects sponsored by the CCSA on behalf of Soviet Jewry. Included are a variety of pioneering activities intended to publicize and educate the public about the

plight of Soviet Jewry, e.g., protest seals (i.e., stamps to be affixed to envelopes), community rallies, the Soviet Jewry Freedom Caravan, and the Spotlight newsletter; and to establish contact with and support activities of Jews in the USSR, e.g., holiday greeting cards and books for Hebrew teachers. Also of interest are files on controversial policies and actions of the government of Israel (e.g., folders 99 and 120). In addition, six folders of debriefings include information gleaned from tourists to the Soviet Union who made contact with Jews or who spoke with Soviet officials.

Series II: Union of Councils for Soviet Jewry consists of two sub-series: Correspondence, and Subject and Program Files. Many of the files predate the creation of the UCSJ, but were later identified as UCSJ records.

<u>Sub-Series 1A</u>, Administrative and General Correspondence, includes correspondence between UCSJ and member councils, press releases, telegrams, newspaper clippings, annual conference programs, and UCSJ statements concerning Congressional proposals.

Sub-Series 1B, Correspondence with Affiliated Local Councils, consists of correspondence, arranged by council, between the UCSJ office in Cleveland and UCSJ member organizations. The correspondence generally relates to local and national activities, requests for information or program materials, discussions of national and international events affecting Soviet Jews and the Soviet Jewry movement, and questions of policy. In addition, the local councils supplied a large volume of press clippings illustrating their activities.

Sub-Series IC, Correspondence with Non-Affiliated Committees and Councils, includes the same types of materials as those found in Sub-Series IB. (During the early and mid-1970s many organizations to aid Soviet Jewry were established but did not join the UCSJ.)

<u>Sub-Series 1D</u>, Correspondence with Individuals and Groups by State, consists of correspondence of individuals and organizations interested in the movement but either not affiliated with a Soviet Jewry group or having an organizational mandate not specifically Soviet Jewry-related.

Sub-Series 1E, Correspondence with Youth Groups and Hillels, contains material from college and university groups. These were among the earliest to address the issue of Soviet anti-semitism and were often the most militant, engaging in confrontational protests against visiting Soviet officials, embassies and consulates, and cultural troupes.

Sub-Series 2, Subject and Program Files, consists of records relating to activites sponsored by the UCSJ. Of particular historical interest are the People-to-People projects designed to put individual Americans in contact with individual Soviet Jews, folders 249-253 and 268; the action oriented publications aimed at local Soviet Jewry councils, folders 223-228 and 239-242; confrontations with Soviet cultural groups; projects to provide financial and material aid to Jews in the USSR, folders 249-251, 256, 257, and 265; and congressional political activities, folders 244-246, 262, 273, and 274. In addition, this sub-series includes lists of Soviet Jews applying for emigration by geographical location in the Soviet Union.

Series III: Publications, consists of two sub-series: Local Council and National newsletters, Bulletins and Advisories; and Bulletins, Journals, Newsletters and Miscellaneous Publications. The former was maintained in the CCSA files as a separate series of publications. The latter sub-series was created artifically from the large number of publications collected by the CCSA and UCSJ.

Sub-Series 1, Local Council and National Newsletters, Bulletins and Advisories, is comprised primarily of materials published by local USCJ affiliated and non-affiliated councils and committees. They cover a broad range, focusing on local activities relating to Soviet Jews.

Sub-Series 2, Bulletins, Journals, Newsletters and Miscellaneous Publications, consists of a variety of publications relating to Soviet Jewry. In some cases, the publications are single or limited issue works. There are also titles with comprehensive runs, including The Chronicle of Human Rights published by Amnesty International; Jews in the USSR; Jews and the Jewish People, a multi-volume compilation of articles from the Soviet press regarding Soviet Jews and Israel dating 1960-1975; The Samizdat Bulletin, translations of articles published by the "self-publishing" or free press movement in the Soviet Union, dating 1973-1983; and a series of translations of articles about Jews appearing in the Soviet Press, supplied by the Israeli government, dated from 1967-1971. Many of the publications are in Russian.

The CCSA Records provide an intimate look at the early era in the American movement on behalf of Soviet Jewry, when the CCSA was instrumental in putting the cause of Soviet Jews before the public. Because the records were maintained by Louis Rosenblum, principle leader of the CCSA and first president of the UCSJ, they also provide a detailed view of his work in the movement. Rosenblum's notations in the CCSA and UCSJ records concerning individuals, organizations, and events, along with his correspondence, reveal his opinions about the failure of the "established" Jewish community organizations to provide effective action on behalf of Soviet Jews and of attempts by the Israeli government to control activities related to Soviet Jews both in the West and in Israel.

The CCSA and the UCSJ records are indispensable to the scholar studying the genesis of the Soviet Jewry movement and the problems, failures, and successes experienced in its early and maturer stages. In addition, the collection provides information regarding American-Soviet relations and lobbying in Congress to affect policy toward the Soviet Union.

All photographs, microfilms, and slides have been removed to the photograph and print collection (Picture Group 287). All tapes (a total of 144 cassette and reel-to-reel) have been removed to the tape collection. All motion pictures have been removed to the motion picture collection.
